KIA ORA *and* GREETINGS

Changing the world one life at a time is a well-known phrase associated with the Adventist Development and Relief Agency (ADRA) all around the world. On a recent trip to Cambodia I saw this 'changing the world' first hand. About two hours north of Phnom Penh we met a lady named Sin Phar who had participated in an ADRA training focusing on health and nutrition, and small business development. Since the training she has started a successful fish farm and has improved her agriculture farming techniques, which has changed her life dramatically. She is now able to feed her family regularly through an increased income from the business, provide basic health care to her children through the health training and she also has access to clean water and improved sanitation with a newly installed well and latrine. This is certainly an obvious change in one life, but the amazing part of this story is what she has done with the change. Sin Par is now the leader of one of the training groups that has about 20 – 30 members, she is responsible for organizing the group, running the training and supporting the members. These groups called Reflect Circles cover everything from domestic violence to savings and banking support. The Reflect Circles have been a support to thousands of women in Cambodia and continue to reach more and more people as the groups multiply. This year has been challenging, with the refocusing of the NZ Aid Programme, which has seen more emphasis on accountability and outcomes and a much tighter criteria for project selection. Part of the training we provide to our participants like Sin Phar is how to adapt in a changing world and this is exactly what ADRA has been able to do. We have worked through these changes and continue to maintain a great relationship with our donors, volunteers and the NZ Ministry of Foreign Affairs and we aim to continue this over the coming years. ADRA would like extend a big 'Thank You' to all those who support our work, your contributions of time and money is what has enabled us to 'change the world one life at a time'.



I am CONTRIBUTING

ON THE WEST COAST OF THE CENTRAL NORTH ISLAND OF NEW ZEALAND the region of Taranaki has some of the richest farmland in the world.

This area also has some of the largest social problems due to poor employment, addiction issues and low economic standards especially in the city of New Plymouth.

ADRA funds a gardening and horticultural complex that goes a long way to provide healthy and fresh vegetables to much of the community and these are harvested and maintained by volunteers like Keine who spend hours of his time working at the gardens making sure that the crops are well cared for.

“I am retired now and it is great to get out here and meet people and at the same time I can see things growing and distributed for the benefit of the whole community” says Keine. “I don’t have to work fast and I have time to chat to the others and it is satisfying to see the way God has provided for all our needs” he adds.

I *am* SERVING

I AM MR. LIM, AND I DRIVE A TUK TUK MOBILE LIBRARY, WHICH HAS BEEN SETUP AND FUNDED BY THE ADRA CHILD¹ PROJECT.

EVERY MONTH, I VISIT EACH VILLAGE AND BOTH CHILDREN AND ADULTS ARE ENCOURAGED TO BORROW BOOKS TO TAKE HOME. THE MOBILE LIBRARY HAS OVER 100 BOOKS, AND MOST OF THE BOOKS HAVE LOTS OF PICTURES, WHICH THE CHILDREN LIKE. THEY OFTEN TAKE THEM HOME TO READ TO THE REST OF THEIR FAMILY. WHEN I VISIT EACH VILLAGE, THE CHILDREN ARE EXCITED TO SEE ME AND OFTEN COME RUNNING. THEY GATHER ROUND IN GROUPS, WHERE I AM ABLE TO READ THEM SOME OF THEIR FAVOURITE STORIES. I AM ABLE TO USE MY SKILLS TO HELP MY PEOPLE.





BIN PHUOC PROVINCE

VIETNAM

I am QUENCHED

I HAVE LIVED IN THE BIN PHUOC PROVINCE IN VIETNAM ALL MY LIFE. In my village, most families earn their living through farming and gardening. In my village there are times when it is hot and dry, and during these times it has always been hard to find enough water. Before we started working with ADRA² in our village, we had built a reservoir, but it wasn't high enough to reach all of the families nearby. As part of the ADRA project, a pump was installed to pump water into family owned water tanks, which we also built during the project. I have a tank which is right next to my house where I live with my wife, children and grandchildren. Now we have enough water for drinking, cooking, cleaning and gardening.

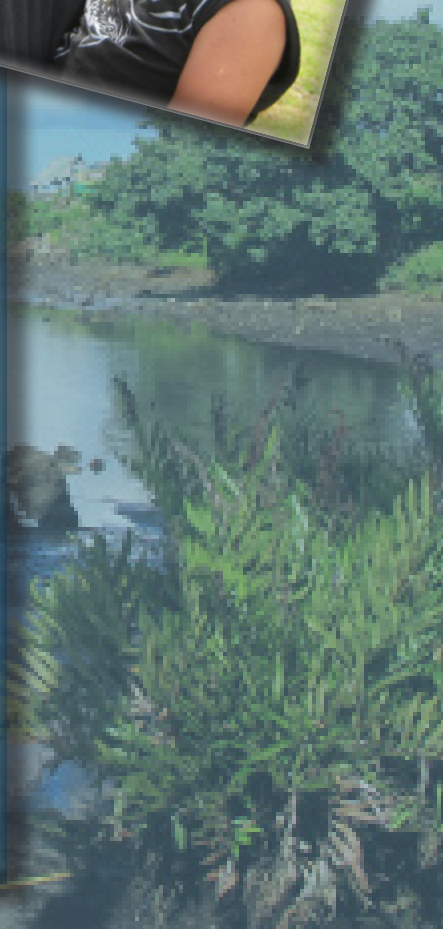
I am RENEWED

WHEN THE TSUNAMI TOOK AWAY OUR VILLAGE OF SALEAPANGA we ran to the high ground and we were too scared to live at sea level again for many weeks.

After the ADRA people arrived they set up classes that taught us how to prepare for future disasters and make plans that would help the older people of the village find their way to safety.

Our house has been provided with many things that will help, we have lamps and batteries and a siren to warn the community and if danger strikes again we have marked out a path to the nearest safe place.

Our lives are nearly back to normal but we still regularly talk about the ADRA lessons we learned and how our villages along the coast have been blessed by the team from ADRA.



I *am* SELF RELIANT

I AM HOSNEARA, I am 25 years old and I and my family live in Dinajpur in Bangladesh. My husband Nazrul was a day labourer and often couldn't find work. This made it difficult for us to earn enough money to look after our two daughters; sometimes we could only give them one meal a day. In 2007, I joined a women's group run by ADRA⁴. After joining this group, I started to save 5 Tikka every week, and I also regularly attended health and literacy sessions. My literacy and health knowledge improved a lot. After 3 months, I was able to get a loan to purchase two small goats then my husband and I worked hard to repay the loan by raising the goats and selling them when they were bigger. Now I have turned this into a business where I have made enough money to buy more small goats and then sell them when they have grown. I am very grateful for the training I have received. I now have a regular stable income and now my family and I are living with respect in our community.

I *am* LITERATE

MY NAME IS BANITA, I am 28 years old, and I am married with 3 children. When I was a girl, I did not go to school because my parents didn't have enough money to send all of my brothers and sisters and me to school. A few years ago, ADRA began a new project³ in our village which meant that I and other women in my village were able to go to classes to learn literacy and numeracy. I was able to learn reading, writing, and counting. Now I am much happier going to the market place because I am now much faster at giving and receiving the correct change. The biggest change for me is the fact that I am now confident enough to talk publicly in front of the rest of my village, including the men and important people. I am very happy to be able to share my thoughts and feelings and to have my say in important decisions that affect my family.

AUDITOR'S REPORT ON CONDENSED FINANCIAL REPORT
TO THE MEMBERS OF ADVENTIST DEVELOPMENT AND RELIEF AGENCY NEW ZEALAND
The condensed financial report comprises the balance sheet and the comprehensive income statement for Adventist Development and Relief Agency for the year ended 30 June 2010.

THE BOARD OF MANAGEMENT OF THE ENTITY IS RESPONSIBLE FOR THE PREPARATION AND TRUE AND FAIR PRESENTATION OF THE FINANCIAL REPORT IN ACCORDANCE WITH NEW ZEALAND ACCOUNTING STANDARDS. THIS INCLUDES RESPONSIBILITY FOR THE MAINTENANCE OF ADEQUATE ACCOUNTING RECORDS AND INTERNAL CONTROLS THAT ARE DESIGNED TO PREVENT AND DETECT FRAUD AND ERROR, AND FOR THE ACCOUNTING POLICIES AND ACCOUNTING ESTIMATES INHERENT IN THE FINANCIAL REPORT.

AUDIT APPROACH

OUR AUDIT HAS BEEN CONDUCTED IN ACCORDANCE WITH NEW ZEALAND AUDITING STANDARDS TO PROVIDE REASONABLE ASSURANCE WHETHER THE CONDENSED FINANCIAL REPORT IS FREE FROM MATERIAL MISSTATEMENT. WE HAVE ALSO PERFORMED AN AUDIT OF THE FULL FINANCIAL REPORT OF ADVENTIST DEVELOPMENT AND RELIEF AGENCY FOR THE YEAR ENDED 30 JUNE 2010.

OUR AUDIT REPORT ON THE FULL FINANCIAL REPORT WAS SIGNED ON 18 MAY 2011, AND WAS SUBJECT TO THE FOLLOWING QUALIFICATION:

"CASH FROM DONATIONS AND OTHER FUND RAISING ACTIVITIES ARE A SIGNIFICANT SOURCE OF REVENUE FOR ADVENTIST DEVELOPMENT AND RELIEF AGENCY. ALTHOUGH THE MANAGEMENT OF ADVENTIST DEVELOPMENT AND RELIEF AGENCY HAVE IMPLEMENTED SYSTEMS OF CONTROLS TO ENSURE MONIES RECEIVED AT ITS OFFICES ARE PROPERLY RECORDED IN THE ACCOUNTING RECORDS, IT IS IMPRACTICABLE TO ESTABLISH CONTROL OVER THE COLLECTION OF REVENUE FROM THESE SOURCES PRIOR TO RECEIPT AT ITS OFFICE.

OUR AUDIT PROCEDURES WITH RESPECT TO REVENUE FROM THESE SOURCES HAD TO BE RESTRICTED TO THE AMOUNTS RECORDED IN THE FINANCIAL RECORDS. AS A RESULT WE ARE UNABLE TO EXPRESS AN OPINION AS TO WHETHER REVENUE FROM CASH DONATIONS AND OTHER FUNDRAISING ACTIVITIES IS COMPLETE."

OUR PROCEDURES IN RESPECT OF THE AUDIT OF THE CONDENSED FINANCIAL REPORT INCLUDED TESTING THAT THE INFORMATION IN THE CONDENSED FINANCIAL REPORT IS CONSISTENT WITH THE FULL FINANCIAL REPORT AND EXAMINATION ON A TEST BASIS, OF EVIDENCE SUPPORTING AMOUNTS, DISCUSSION AND ANALYSIS, AND OTHER DISCLOSURES WHICH WERE NOT DIRECTLY DERIVED FROM THE FULL FINANCIAL REPORT.

THE AUDIT OPINION EXPRESSED IN THIS REPORT HAS BEEN FORMED ON THE ABOVE BASIS.

AUDIT OPINION

IN OUR OPINION, AS INTERNAL AUDITORS OF THE GENERAL CONFERENCE OF THE SEVENTH-DAY ADVENTIST CHURCH, THE CONDENSED FINANCIAL REPORT OF ADVENTIST DEVELOPMENT AND RELIEF AGENCY IS CONSISTENT WITH THE FULL REPORT REFERRED TO ABOVE FROM WHICH THEY ARE DERIVED.
