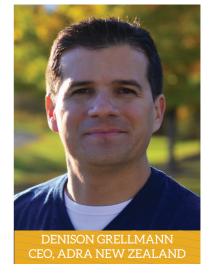

This level of recognition would not be possible without the professional and committed team we have here at ADRA New Zealand.

### **AT HOME**

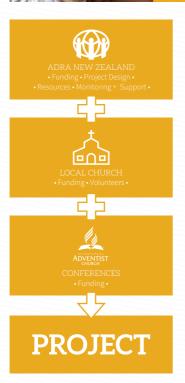

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Report of the Internal Auditor on the Summary Financial Statements

To the Board of Management Adventist Development and Relief Agency Auckland. New Zealand

The accompanying summary financial statements, which comprise the balance sheets as at 30 June 2016 and 2015 and the summary income statements for the years then ended, are derived from the audited financial statements of **Adventist Development and Relief Agency** ("the Organisation") for the years ended 30 June 2016 and 2015. We expressed qualified audit opinions on those financial statements in our reports dated 23 November 2016 and 16 November 2015.

The summary financial statements do not contain all the disclosures required by New Zealand Accounting Standards generally accepted by the Seventh-day Adventist denomination. Reading the summary financial statements, therefore, is not a substitute for reading the audited financial statements of the Organisation.

#### Responsibility of the Board of Management for the Summary Audited Financial Statements

The Board of Management is responsible for the preparation of a summary of the audited financial statements in accordance with New Zealand Accounting Standards generally accepted by the Seventh-day Adventist denomination.

#### Auditor's Responsibility

Our responsibility is to express an opinion on the summary financial statements based on our procedures, which were conducted in accordance with International Standard on Auditing (NZ) 810 "Engagements to Report on Summary Financial Statements."

#### Opinion

In our opinion, the summary financial statements derived from the audited financial statements of **Adventist Development and Relief Agency** for the years ended 30 June 2016 and 2015 are consistent, in all material respects, with those financial statements, on the bases described in Note 2. However, the summary financial statements are qualified to the equivalent extent as the audited financial statements of the Organisation for the years ended 30 June 2016 and 2015.

The qualification of the audited financial statements is described in our qualified audit opinions in our reports dated 23 November 2016 and 16 November 2015. Our qualified audit opinions are based on the fact that it is not practicable for the Organisation to maintain an effective system of internal control over the collection of donations and other fund raising activities until their initial entry into the accounting records of the Organisation.

Accordingly, our audit of donations and other fund raising activities and donations was limited to amounts recorded. Our qualified audit opinions state that, except for the possible effects of the matters described in the Basis for Qualified Opinion paragraphs, the financial statements present fairly, in all material respects, the financial position of the Organisation as at 30 June 2016 and 2015, and the results of its operations and its cash flows for the years then ended in conformity with New Zealand accounting standards generally accepted by the Seventh-day Adventist denomination.
