When the Sustainable Rural Economic (SURE) project started in Myanmar, the aim was to impact thousands of families by increasing their harvest. This was to be achieved through installation of innovative irrigation systems to allow farmers to grow a more diverse range of crops. The farmers of Satalai came together and through their hard work and selfless dedication to their community, received an Elephant Foot Yam (EFY) slicing machine. This machine will enable them to be more productive and foster stronger community relationships. Your generous support has made amazing things happen in this village and the community is thriving!

Joy of the heart! First and foremost, I would like to express my hearty thanks to ADRA on behalf of Satalai Villagers for the support that we have been receiving even though we don't deserve it. More proudly, we are deeply glad to be the first to receive "Elephant Foot Yam (EFY) Slicing Machine" out of the 12 villages involved in the SURE project in Matupi Township of Southern Chin State.

We were all excited at the possibility when we first heard about EFY slicing machine from Value Chain and Marketing Officer's first meeting with the people. Honestly, we did not dare to expect it to become reality as there are 12 villages and the selection criteria was of course highly competitive.

However, the dream has turned into reality and it brought about endless joy in our hearts. I am deeply sure that my co-villagers share the same joy and excitement with me. As we are trying to shift from conventional slash and burn agriculture to sustainable agriculture, receiving the EFY slicing machine is really a blessing. Now each household is growing EFY and trying to extend the acres of cultivation each year and better product and higher harvest is also expected year after year. EFY has now become the main stream of family income for each household.

In the previous years, we used our labor to wash and slice EFY and it took days to finish even a small quantity, but from this year onwards, we will be saved by the slicer; its function is really dynamic. The machine is able to finish thousands of kilograms per day, thus saving time and labor. In a broader sense, the installation of EFY slicing machine in our village will certainly instil the spirit of oneness in the midst of our diversity in many aspects. It will unite and push us to work harder in unity to achieve greater things in the future. It is our prayer that God may bless ADRA and its mission in Myanmar and across the globe!

"With your basket and my basket we will sustain the people"

The Pātaka Kai Open Street Pantry Movement is one of the latest community initiatives ADRA is delighted to support and be a part of. Through the selfless dedication of the kaitiaki (guardians) and the various food donors, this initiative will see 120 Pātaka Kai (food pantries) in total built and delivered throughout Auckland and Northland (60 in each region).

The Pātaka Kai Open Street Pantry provides the platform for people to get to know each other and build strong new relationships that are shared with no work restricted requirements, timelines or red tape. It has enabled even those who are most disadvantaged, to be part of the initiative and to have a sense of self-worth despite their own current situations.

One kaitiaki Janie looks after a pantry on Bairds Rd in Otara. Janie has been a beneficiary for most of her life. She is in her late 50's, a single mum, having lived in her two story state house for much of her life with 3 children. Janie shed a tear and shared "this is the first time in years I've felt like I've had anything to offer others". For the first time in almost two decades she felt self-worth.

Bronwyn, another kaitiaki of the Valiant St pantry in Mangere, shared her amazement at the number of people that have reached out to donate and offer support from the neighbourhood since their recent opening. "I'm blown away by it all and look forward to meeting more of the neighbours. My family has lived here for years and I'm only just meeting some of my neighbours".

Being a kaitiaki of a pantry also comes with challenges such as people mistreating food and/or the pantry. However, these challenges can also help to develop skills such as problem solving, conflict resolution and effective communication. The negatives are few and are

far outweighed by the positives, especially as more and more neighbours take ownership and responsibility for their local Pataka Kai.

Today ADRA would like to thank and acknowledge all those who are a part of this initiative in particular all the Kaitiaiki for their dedication and giving their time to love and serve others daily through this movement. The kaitiaki spend a lot of their own personal time liaising with others to source food and product, organising communications to the community, sorting and distribution of food, queries, and keeping the pantry clean and organised. Without them none of this would be possible. The support from the community has also been fantastic, so we want to say thank you to our donors for being part of an initiative that is making a real difference to New Zealand communities.

CONNECTIONS

This coming April holidays, Christchurch Adventist School (CAS) are taking their Year 13 Students on a service trip with the ADRA Connections program. The students will be working with ADRA New Zealand's Water, Sanitation, Hygiene Promotion and Resilience Building project. This project aims to reduce the disease rate in Vanuatu by providing communities with safe water, sanitary hygiene facilities and education about safe hygiene practices.

The students will help increase access to safe drinking water by building one large water tank and 5 safe sanitation facilities (latrines) for the Butmas community. They will be working hard days digging, laying pipes, mixing concrete and building privacy walls. Lots of fun will be had at the kid's clubs where the students will be teaching the children about sanitation and hygiene through songs and games.

The CAS students have selflessly dedicated themselves over the last 12 months and engaged in a number of fundraisers to make this trip happen. They worked very hard and ran events such as regular bake sales and a school wide Fun run, where the entire school was sponsored to participate. The students also did their own individual fundraising by offering services such as knife sharpening, baby sitting, car washing and hosting dinners. These efforts were topped-up by a number of churches that donated over \$1,250 towards the trip.



Involving students in an ADRA Connections trip creates a sense of community and taking ownership of an experience like this encourages them to work together. Through their planning and fundraising activities, students already start to take on challenges and achieve great things even before they leave the country. This sense of achievement only grows greater once they start working hard at their building project.

ADRA is excited to partner with schools and give students an opportunity to see the real world firsthand and how they can make a life changing difference to those in need. Students never come back from a trip unchanged, as the experience is both confronting and rewarding.

We would love for you to pray for the safety of the students travelling this April, and for their hearts to be open to the Lord's guidance.
