Dear friends,

When you hear the term generosity, what comes to your mind? The word generosity has been a concept to humanity for centuries. The word itself has its roots in the 6th Century from a Latin word generosus, which means "of noble birth". To be generous, was literally a way to connect ones self to nobility. Over time however, the meaning of this word began to change. It no longer applied to the nobility of birth or aristocracy, but to the nobility of spirit. The meaning continued to change and grew in dimension to denote an action to others; giving to others. In its contemporary meaning, generosity signifies the formation of a moral orientation to life and rejection of all forms of selfishness.

The effects of generosity are endless. My life is one that has been affected by some generous people. Let me share one personal story with you. When I graduated from high school in Brazil, I really wanted to explore the world and learn English. I knew that learning the world's lingua franca was important, especially if one day I was to work with ADRA. This dream seemed unattainable. Living in a country with high inflation meant that whatever I earned during the month, was usually worth 25% of its value by the time pay day came. As a university student and part-timer at a factory, I was not able to save much and saw my dream of learning English starting to fade away. To cut a long story short, I was blessed by a very generous man. When he learnt of my desire to learn English and serve as student missionary in South Africa, he paid for my plane ticket in full, which at the time was about USD 2,000. He had no obvious reason to do it, but he was compelled by love to act and just trusted me. He did not know me, nor of my past, but he chose to believe in my dreams to serve and learn, and acted with such generosity. In the end, I did go to South Africa, served as a student missionary and learnt English. To date, I have served with ADRA for over 20 years.

When Jesus was on this earth, He showed us the way. He showed that we need to care for the most vulnerable, for the widows, the oppressed, and the poor. Jesus emphasised that the life of a Christian is a life of service, a life of generosity. Being generous makes us less self-centered and more people-centered. It's actually a great honour to be called a generous person, and a legacy that I'm sure you and I want to be remembered for. In ADRA's ministry of compassion, we rely on generous people and I sincerely want to thank you for being one of them.

Please enjoy the stories that follow. I hope they give you a glimpse of the impact that you have made through your generosity. I also hope they will encourage you to become even more generous with the talents that God has abundantly entrusted you with.

Mizpah Community Barber

When Mizpah SDA church started up the Mizpah Community Barber (MCB) initiative as a new way to connect with their community, they weren't too sure what to expect. Pastor Keli Pepa, who had previous experience as a barber was going to give free haircuts once every month, along with distributing food parcels and pre-loved clothes to those in need. When word of the free barbershop spread, barbers from Da Spot Barbershop volunteered to help. Initially they thought it would be a one off, but when they saw the impact it had on the children and families that came through the doors, their hearts were moved to come back every month. The barbers said "it's amazing what a haircut can do to someone, it just gives them an opportunity to feel good about themselves". They have also noticed an increase in their own business, which is a true testimony that when we are generous with our talents, the Lord blesses and multiplies what we have given.

Water for Ambae evacuees in Maewo

In April this year, over 10,000 people were forced to permanently evacuate their homes due to volcanic threat on Ambae, Vanuatu. Jennifer, a mother of five shared "leaving home was sad and difficult and we did not know what to expect." One of the big challenges displaced families are facing is access to clean water, which for Jennifer was over an hours walk away. Since April, ADRA has been able to provide over 340 hygiene kits, 170 taps, 10 water catchment tanks and over 100 latrines to support communities with Ambae residents as they rebuild their lives and readjust to a new home. ADRA has installed a water tap in Jennifer's community, allowing her and the 50 other families in her community access to clean water all year round. "We are thankful," Jennifer shares "for helping to bring water to our door step."

My connection with ADRA began after a visit from one of the ADRA leaders to my home church in Tauranga. It was a simple decision, maybe

because I am blessed with a good income. My 4 children are now independent so there was no reason not to supply some additional support.

I am sure this causes something supernatural to happen in your soul. It's about going past your present circumstances and day to day living and putting God first.See I



am really giving to God not to ADRA, and ADRA are empowered to administer that. I am sure that you have heard it said before that the giver is always blessed more than the receiver. I can vouch for that.

My personal journey in the past 12 months has been overwhelming. I re-married in October 2017, then in November 2017 I was diagnosed with pancreatic cancer stage 4. What a bomb shell for Debbie and I. How little did we know that when we delivered our wedding vows to each other, we would be exercising the vow of sickness. Our relationship has been more in the presence of sickness than in health. Where does one look for joy in the battle. The battle of new love, the battle of faith? I have found it so important that despite the circumstances, life carries on. It's no reason to give up on your commitments, including financial support. A critical part of my therapy is to maintain a sense of normality in life, engaging in family events, taking holidays, continuing to engage in work.

If you are connected to a local church I have come to realise it's no different in many ways to a public hospital. Sometimes I arrive at church and I feel like I need to be in ICU. Other days just a follow up as an outpatient. Our churches are riddled with people with all sorts of conditions, all treatable in the local church. Our individual challenge is having the guts to take down the mask and expose those real issues. It's possibly a larger challenge for the local church to confront the tensions (e.g. being authentic in interactions with every person, dealing with/ accepting pride, being vulnerable) that these issues present to the body of Christ. In basic terms, dealing with the humanism to remove the mask to allow us to know our true self - how we're feeling and what is going on. The key difference between a public hospital and the local church is the advantage of direct access to our master physician our Lord Jesus Christ, the Father and the wonderful Holy Spirit.

So, I appeal to your heart to consider ways that you can honour God over and above what you are doing now, with your resources.

What inspired you to partner with ADRA?

Helping those who are in desperate need. I love what ADRA represents. ADRA's CTP initiative also helps churches connect with the community in a practical, tangible and sustainable way.

Through the support of ADRA, the local church, and other partners, we have developed good connections with our local community. We are also grateful to be able to partner with others such as Orange Sky (mobile laundry and shower), to provide more services. Through MCB we have seen people from all walks of life come through our church. It has been inspiring to see how this initiative has benefitted so many, and how something as simple as a haircut can make a big difference. At the same time, it has seen an increase in our church member engagement. At first, we had mainly the youth volunteering, but now we have our older folks stepping in and helping too. Through the generosity of all those involved, we've established a wonderful platform to serve, connect and make a real difference in the community!
